


What is Canadian Encyclopedia?

The Canadian Encyclopedia is a free online resource that plays an essential role in providing Canadians and others with accurate, updated information about our people and country. Currently, the Encyclopedia hosts more than 19,000+ bilingual articles and has more than 5,000 contributors. All entries in the Encyclopedia are reviewed by their dedicated editorial staff for accuracy and academic quality.

How to Access Canadian Encyclopedia

1. From the vaughanpl.info website, select the *Articles & Research* button from the search bar at the top of the screen.



2. From the following screen, select the letter "C" to filter results by name and select *Canadian Encyclopedia* to go to the resource.




Using Canadian Encyclopedia

The Canadian Encyclopedia is an online database of primary and secondary sources of historical material and media that can help give a broad Canadian perspective on topics of research. The resource allows you to browse various topics as well as perform keyword searches to locate specific information. This is a solid source to get a broad overview on your topic.

How to Search for Information

1. You can use the search bar to perform a basic keyword search. Keywords are phrases or words that relate to the information you want to know more about (e.g. "health" or "climate change.")




2. Results can be filtered by content type (e.g. Articles, Quizzes, Videos, etc.)
3. At the bottom of the article, there will be a list of other reputable sources on the same topic.

How to Browse for Information

1. Information in the Canadian Encyclopedia is organized into *Collections* that are organized by *People*, *Places* and *Things*.

Click Browse and choose the category you want to explore (e.g. Science & Technology)



2. On the left side of the screen, you can narrow your search under *Science & Technology* to specific topic (e.g. Astronaut)



- From here, you can narrow your search through the filters and choose your article(s) (e.g. Chris Hatfield).
- If you use or quote any of the article's information, you can use the citation option on the right side of the screen that will automatically cite in numerous formats that you can copy and paste into a file.

Chris Austin Hadfield, OC, OOnt, astronaut, military test pilot (born 29 August 1959 in Samia, ON). After a distinguished career as a test pilot, Hadfield became an astronaut in 1992. Over the course of his career, he achieved a series of Canadian firsts: he was the first Canadian to be a space mission specialist, to operate the Canadarm in orbit, to do a spacewalk and to command the International Space Station. He was also the first to record a music video in space — a cover of David Bowie's "Space Oddity" — adding to his celebrity status. Hadfield retired from the Canadian Astronaut Corps in July 2013. In 2014, he began teaching in the University of Waterloo's aviation program.
